In 1958, a small group of parents began meeting to determine how best to educate their children with developmental disabilities. As parents, wanting more for their children, they dared to dream of the opportunity for education and an enriching life for their loved ones to reach their full potential. This inspiring group of parents bonded together to create the first day school program

in McHenry County, Illinois for children with developmental disabilities. The act of determination led to the creation of the organization that would become Pioneer Center for Human Services. This grassroot beginnings was decades before the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) was established noting the founders' courageous efforts for a more inclusive world.

As I reflect on fiscal year 2022, Pioneer Center never wavered on our mission, but moved past the pandemic and clearly emerged stronger, accomplishing established strategic goals and objectives. Although the effects of the pandemic caused labor crises, market complexities and shortages, our Human Resource Team deftly established various hiring practices to overcome these obstacles. Our staff of approximately 200 performed incredibly well by adapting, collaborating and finding ways to overcome these challenges, while maintaining high quality services.

We are heading towards 65 years of service to the community, and we do so with unwavering dedication, passion and pride. Each pillar of our services, **Developmental Disabilities, Behavioral Health and Homeless Services**, is vital to meeting the needs of our community, its growth, wellness and success. Our diversity in services

Our key accomplishment on the Developmental Disabilities Pillar includes a Community Day Program in the Woodstock Square, an Adult Autism Group Home in McHenry and partnering with the Northern Illinois Special Recreation Association (NISRA) to establish a Recreational Day Program (Bright) in Huntley. These three new programs serve to integrate our clients with the community, consistent with our mission of independence and inclusion.

Other key accomplishments across the other two Pillars, Behavioral Health and Homeless Services, includes planning work on final phase of the new PADS Homeless Shelter by adding a family room, staff offices, conference room and floor upgrade and leading efforts to migrate to a new Electronic Health Record System (EHR) to support future service growth, best practices, productivity and efficiency. In addition, we re-designed and introduced our new logo as seen on the cover page of this Annual Report with a tag line that says it all: "Passion to Serve. Commitment to Care". It is about our passionate team and their commitment to care, serving all our clients.

We are grateful to our donors, grantors and volunteers that continue to help and support us. You have positioned us to focus on the long-term sustainability of Pioneer Center and our strategic needs.

DEVELOPMENTAL DISABILITY SERVICES

The goal of the Developmental Disabilities (DD) pillar is to provide services that enable people to reach their full potential. We deliver a wide variety of vital services and programs to the community that promote independence by offering life skills, coaching/training, opportunities to be an active member in their community, vocational training and residential living options.

Our programs promote independence through skill acquisition. Every program strives to enable those we serve with the dignity, well-being, independence, and inclusion necessary to live life to their fullest potential. The following is a list of programs and services offered by the DD Pillar.

In 2022, our newest residential home in McHenry opened in response to the growing need for services for individuals with autism. This new home provides additional support and specialized training focusing on skill acquisition, behavior management and independence.





IMPACTFUL STATISTICS

- 665 Active Clients across all DD programs and Services
- 118 New Client intakes across DD programs
- 74 Clients served in DD Residential Programs
- 98 Clients served in Community Employment Services Program
- 54 Individuals with disabilities found community-based employment, 40 of whom found a job in under 90 days
- 119 Clients were able to maintain independence living alone or with family through support from our home-based, intermittent Residential and Community Family Program Services

BEHAVIORAL HEALTH SERVICES

Behavioral Health provides therapeutic services for children, teens, adults and families at all levels of care. Prevention Education facilitates groups and presents to schools and community groups about suicide, runaway and child abuse prevention. Crisis Intervention responds 24/7 to youth at risk of family separation due to run away or homelessness. Outpatient and home-based therapists utilize trauma-informed, evidence-based practices to empower clients to achieve their therapeutic goals. Behavioral Health Residential programs allow adults with mental illness to gain independent living skills and practice self-advocacy in a supportive environment. All Behavioral Health services are strength-based and client-centered to instill hope and promote resilience.



IMPACTFUL STATISTICS

- 525 Active Clients across all Behavioral Health programs
- 229 New client intakes across Therapy and Mentoring services
- 28 Residential Clients served in our Group Homes
- 102 Runaway and Homeless Youth served
- 94% of our Runaway Homeless Youth (RHY) clients were reunited with their families
- 80% of our Homeless Youths transitioned into stable housing



HOMELESS SERVICES

Pioneer Center for Human Services operates a year-round PADS Homeless Shelter in McHenry, IL at 2805 S. Route 31. The shelter operates 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, 365 days a year for resident clients. PADS is the only homeless shelter program in McHenry County that serves all demographics. PADS main goal is to reconnect those experiencing homelessness with programs throughout the community while providing emergency shelter, food and various services essential for self-sufficiency. When people first come to PADS, our focus is to meet people's most basic needs. This includes food, shelter, clothing, access to lockers, showers, laundry, phones and computers. PADS also operates our own transportation department, commercial kitchen, outreach and hotel voucher program. Our case management staff links people to community supports and resources through programs that are designed for youth, families and individuals experiencing homelessness.



The Hotel Voucher Program has been critical to the well-being of many McHenry County residents. This program is nimble and provides a safe place to shelter within a few hours or less. The program cooperates with every agency in the county, the local police and hospitals. We help the unsheltered residents during extreme cold or heat weather events. People need assistance before they acquire permanent housing or because they were newly evicted. Others need a few days of respite from a serious illness and this helps keep the spread of disease to a minimum. We cooperate with local law enforcement to place people who are vulnerable in a safe place and offer resources to better outcomes. Mental Health hospitals need our services when releasing someone vulnerable with nowhere to go, allowing time and space to make arrangements for next steps.

IMPACTFUL STATISTICS

- 145 people served including 8 families with 13 children
- The transportation program provided 575 client rides to the 73 clients that needed transportation support.
- Homeless clients spent a total of 10,216 nights at PADS and 30,648 meals were served
- The average length of stay for people who exited the program was 87.5 days
- 51% of the people who exited PADS moved to more stable housing.




